## Q. Which families make up the Pagel Family Reunion?

A. The descendants of Gottfried and Friedrike Pagel who immigrated to Texas in 1850. Their nine children were Friedrich Wilhelm Pagel, Carl Friedrich (Charles) Pagel, August Pagel, Minna Fischer, Fredericka Ladewig, Friedrich Samuel (Fritz) Pagel, Emilie Appelt Schott, Ernest Pagel, and Julius Pagel.

(During the past year we have located ninety-one more descendants of August Pagel thanks to the efforts of Pagel Family friend, Joyce Speakerman Holcomb.)

### The Pagels in Texas: Friedrich Wilhelm & Magdalena Fritsche Pagel

A biography of our immigrant patriarch, Gottfried Pagel, was offered in last year's Pagel Family Times. This year the story of his oldest son, Friedrich Wilhelm Pagel, is told,

Friedrich "Wilhelm" Pagel was born in Kortenhagen in Pomerania in June of 1834. He was the oldest known child of Gottfried and Friedrike (Dikow) Pagel. The Pagels brought their family of eight children to Texas aboard the "Brasilian" in 1850. The family settled in Fayette County near what is now Willow Springs, but Friedrike died soon after a ninth child was born in 1853.

Magdalena (or Lana) Fritsche was born in Friedersdorf in Saxony on August 11, 1839. She was the only child of Johann and Johanna (Born) Fritsche. In 1854 the Fritsches set sail for Texas aboard the "Ben Nevis" with the group of Lusatian Wends who founded Serbin. Unfortunately, Johann Fritsche died during the voyage.

Magdalena and her mother made their way to the German-Wendish settlement in Industry where only a few months later Johanna (or Anna) married Gottfried Pagel on April 15, 1855. On January 31,

1858 his son, Wilhelm, and her daughter, Magdalena, also married. About that time Gottfried and Anna moved to Lavaca County near Hallettsville with most of his children. Wilhelm and Magdalena stayed behind in Fayette County, living on his father's 192 acres near Cummins Creek. In 1867 he bought this tract from his father for nineteen hundred dollars.

The Wilhelm Pagels had six children whose baptisms were all recorded at the Trinity Evangelical Lutheran Church at Frelsburg in Colorado County:

- 1. Franz Edmund (Frank) (5 October 1858 15 January 1949) who married Wilhelmina Schiller, farmed at Willow Springs and retired to Fayetteville.
- 2. Emma Emily (11 December 1859 13 November 1951) who married Ernst Carl Albrecht who farmed at Willow Springs and retired to Fayetteville.
- 3. William Albert (23 April 1862 12 July 1916) who married Helene Jashek and farmed at Willow Springs and (shortly before he died) near Taylor.
- 4. Ernst Theodore (17 April 1865 17 September 1938) who married Mathilda Alvina Zapp and was prominent in Fayetteville.
- 5. Ida (11 January 1868 15 December 1951) who married Ferdinand Schultz and lived in Oklahoma.
- 6. Helen (16 May 1871 17 June 1957) who married Hugo Emil Zapp and lived in Houston.

In 1866 Friedrich Wilhelm Pagel bought additional land from M. S. Mc-Ginnis at Willow Springs. There he built a rock house over a cellar and covered it with plaster. He farmed and operated a general merchandise store. The community became known as Rockhouse after his home when he became its first postmaster on October 12, 1871.

Friedrich Wilhelm Pagel died when he was only thirty-nine years old on October 21, 1873. His is the oldest known grave in the Pagel Cemetery near Willow Springs. An inventory taken at the time of his death showed 405 acres of land in the Willow Springs area. He also (Continued on back page)

(Friedrich Wilhelm Pagel continued) had merchandise in his store valued at two thousand dollars, nine head of horses and mules, twenty head of cattle, twelve hogs, and a road wagon, farming utensils, and household furnishings. In addition he had \$2,898.10 in notes and \$5,043.84 in accounts that were due to him, making his estate valued at \$14,501.94.

Gottfried Pagel had died only two months earlier, so Anna Pagel moved back to Fayette County to live with Magdalena and her young family. Mrs. Pagel relinquished the post office and it was moved three miles east to the present community of Rockhouse by A.C. Surman. (In about 1881 C.T. Zapp became a postmaster at Willow Springs and the community also became known as Zapp.)

Magdalena Pagel died on July 13, 1886 at the age of forty-six and was also buried in the Pagel Cemetery. The inventory taken at the time of her death showed 476 acres in Fayette County and 123 acres in Lavaca County, nine horses and mules, thirty-one head of cattle, thirteen hogs, one wagon and one buggy, household and kitchen furniture, farming

## Pagel Family Cemetery Update P

Carl Friedrich (or Charles) Pagel was the second oldest child of Gottfried and Friedrike Dikow Pagel, and his descendants make up the largest of the nine branches represented at the Pagel Family Reunion.

He and his wife Johanna are buried in the Charles Pagel Family Cemetery on what was his estate in Lavaca County. Also buried at this cemetery are his daughters Johanna Dorthea Pagel, Maria Kessler, and Hilda Menking, Christine Roeber, Elizabeth Haeusler (Heisler) and their husbands, as well as his sons Henry and Charles Godfrey Pagel and their wives. Johanna's father Heinrich Kuehne, their son-in-law Rudolph Hen-

kel, and several grandchildren were also laid to rest there.

Traditionally, contributions for maintenance of this cemetery were collected at the Pagel Reunion, but low attendance cut donations drastically.

At our 1996 reunion, Mary Menking announced that a special fund was being set up to provide for the mowing and cleaning of the cemetery. There have been a number of generous contributions, but we hope to hear from more members of this large family.

utensils, twenty-eight bales of cotton, and \$1,258.54 in cash on hand. In addition she had gin house machinery and fixtures worth \$1,000 and notes totaling \$370.45 due to her. This brought the estate total to \$8,882.49. Her son-in-law, Ernst Albrecht, was appointed estate administrator.

Evidently there was a disagreement among Magdalena's children as to how the estate should be divided and the case was brought to court. It was finally settled by private sale of the Fayette County property in partitions to Frank Pagel, William Albert Pagel, and Henry Garlin who was Ernst Albrecht's halfbrother. Wilhelm's brother, Charles Pagel, bought the Lavaca County land. Garlin almost immediately sold Ernst and Emma Albrecht his partition which included the

rock house.

Today only the house's cellar remains. Now known as Wayside Manor, Wm. Pagel's farm is still owned by the Albrecht family. It was registered under the Texas Agriculture Department's Family Land Heritage Program in 1985.
